

Influenza Season



It happens every fall: influenza arrives in Alberta, and takes a serious toll on our communities.

Influenza is a real threat. It's also preventable.

Influenza immunization will be made available, starting October 23, free of charge, to all Albertans six months of age and older.

It's the single most effective means of reducing your risk of influenza, particularly when you receive it as early in the season as possible. By getting immunized early, you will give your body the opportunity to respond to immunization, and produce antibodies that will arm you against the influenza viruses you'll be exposed to again throughout the season.

Each year, influenza vaccine is developed to protect us against the strains of virus likely to circulate in our community. Though vaccine effectiveness may vary, know this: last season, influenza vaccine cut Albertan's risk of influenza by about 40%. Without immunization, Albertans were completely at risk.

And we do mean all Albertans.

Although some individuals (pregnant women, seniors, children, and individuals with underlying health conditions or compromised immune systems) are at greater risk for severe complications, without immunization, even healthy Albertans are at risk of severe illness and even death.

64 Albertans died with influenza last season, and more than 1,600 Albertans were hospitalized.

Let's do better this year.

Prevention is your protection. Get immunized this season.

The decision was based on escalating costs to maintain and operate the rinks, in conjunction with the low usage rates of the rinks over the past several years. While a few new faces were out at the Town Hall, the low member turnout at the meeting was a true indication of the value of the rinks to our members. The Board is committed to utilizing our funds more economically and ensuring that it benefits the entire community through events such as Stars & Cars. La Perle has committed \$5,000 to the operation of Belmead's rink should they decide to operate it this season. 2017/18 is my sixth year I have committed to leading La Perle Community as president. I also served as Treasurer in 2011/12. I have found the experience very rewarding and thank the fantastic Board members I have had the opportunity to work with over my seven years; however, I have decided to step back from the lead role for the 2018/19 year. To access city services in person, the Edmonton Service Centre is a one-stop shop. It is located on the 2nd floor of Edmonton Tower, 10111 104 Avenue across from Rogers Place. Residents and businesses will no longer need to visit various downtown City offices to pay taxes, obtain bus passes and business licences, review engineering and architectural drawings with

City specialists, or do other business with the City. The operating hours are 8am-4:30pm Monday to Friday. The centre is closed on weekends and statutory holidays.

Breast Cancer Screening

Every October during breast cancer awareness month, women are reminded to get checked for breast cancer. That's because breast cancer is still a problem in Alberta and the most common type of cancer for women. In fact, 1 out of every 8 women will be diagnosed in her lifetime. And each day a woman in Alberta will die from the disease. But breast cancer doesn't have to be a death sentence. If we can catch it early, we can treat it and beat it.

Screening mammograms are a way to do just that. Using special x-rays of the breast that check for signs, they can help find breast cancer 2-3 years before it can be felt by a woman or her doctor. Mammograms are the best test we have for breast cancer, and the only test that has been shown to lower the chance of dying by 30%. Thanks in part to screening mammograms, most women (almost 90%) are now surviving breast cancer.

Should you get a mammogram? Women 50 to 74 should plan to have a mammogram once every 2 years, and can self-refer. Women in their 40's can speak to their doctor, and get a referral for their first screening mammogram.

Screening mammograms are available at many clinics in Alberta. To find the closest screening mammography centre near you, call Health Link at 811 or Screening Programs at 1-866-727-3926.

Screen Test is a service that brings free



screening mammograms to rural communities with two mobile clinics. To find out when the next clinic is in your area, call 1-800-667-0604 (toll free).

What else can you do to prevent breast cancer? You can talk to your doctor about your family history of breast cancer and know your risk. Know how your breasts normally look and feel, and get them checked if you find anything unusual. And of course a healthy lifestyle is important. Limiting alcohol, smoking and drinking can also help lower your risk.

Prevention is the best protection. A screening mammogram can save your life. Get a screening mammogram in October.

Yielding to Emergency Vehicles

Time is the enemy in an emergency. For everyone's safety, it is important for motorists to understand how to correctly yield right of way to emergency vehicles with lights and siren activated. You can help EMS, police, and fire get to the scene quickly and safely by following these rules of the road:

When an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated:

• If you're in the middle of an intersection when an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated, safely clear the intersection;

• On a one or two lane road, motorists should move to the right side of the road, slow down, and then stop. Remember to signal;

• On a road with three or more lanes, motorists should move to the nearest side of the road and stop. If driving in the centre lane, move to the right side of the road and stop. Remember to signal;

• Come to a complete stop and wait for the emergency vehicle to pass. Shoulder check for more emergency vehicles (there is often more than one) before re-entering traffic flow. Remember to signal;

· Emergency vehicles might use any available road space to maneuver. This could include the shoulders, turning lanes, in order to pass other traffic.

When operating a vehicle:

· Drive attentively and defensively at all times. Be cognizant to sirens and be prepared to yield the right of way;

• It is Alberta law for motorists to slow down to at least 60 km/hour (unless a lower speed is posted) when driving past a stopped emergency vehicle. This includes EMS, police, fire, and tow trucks with their lights activated;

• Do not break the rules of the road in order to give right of way to an emergency vehicle. This could include proceeding through a red light, or making an illegal turn. Actions such as these jeopardize all motorists in the area;

· Drivers must place their full attention on the roadway and toward the safe operation of their vehicle at all times. The fine for distracted driving in Alberta is \$287.00;

 Always leave plenty of space between your vehicle and an emergency vehicle, should it be required to stop suddenly.

Introducing.... the Arrowhead Trail Lighting Project

The folks in Thorncliff may have noticed a few changes in their community lately. This is especially true for those who use the walking path east of 173 St between the Whitemud overpass and 87 avenue, better known as Arrowhead Trail. The Neighbourhood Empowerment Team generated interested in a project to improve Arrowhead Trail by adding lights.

If this sounds familiar, it might be because this idea was launched in Callingwood North in January of this year. Seven homes on the south side of the Whitemud overpass agreed to take strings of lights and put them on their back fences to help make Arrowhead Trail a friendlier place for everyone using it.

Here is a view of the trail right as it makes its way to Callingwood elementary school. One parent in Callingwood North commented, "I have children who use the trail to and from school every day. They loved the lights and always bragged about having a special place to walk. I think they thought they were in a movie."

Well, if that wasn't successful enough, when we approached people in Thorncliff, there were seven homes between the Whitemud overpass and 82 avenue that signed up in one day for this project! And the feedback in Thorncliff has been just as positive. Neighbours have commented that the lights make Arrowhead Trail more welcoming and have given neighbours and Trail users something to talk to each other about.

A home in Thorncliff has also gotten quite creative with their lights and have strung them up their cedar tree for everyone to enjoy. Paper lanterns have also appeared







on some of the bulbs. If you live on Arrowhead trail between 87 and 82 avenues the Neighbourhood Empowerment Team is planning to visit you and ask if you would join the project.

Even if you do not live directly on the Arrowhead Trail there ways you can lend a hand. If you enjoy the lights, leave a posted note on the fence. Add some knitted tree sweaters. The possibilities of this project are really as big and wide as peoples' imaginations. The lights are a year-round feature, but there are plenty of other ways to make Arrowhead Trail an interesting place to be in all seasons.

Winter will soon be upon us, but that's no reason to stop thinking green. In fact, if people were interesting in doing some gardening along the trail to add some flowers and colour, the autumn and winter is the prime time to start imagining the possibilities and planning for the next year. Interesting planters, back fence gardening and other unique ways of adding colour could be explored as potential additions to the trail.

News Flash - Off Leash Dogs in the Park

Complaints have been made about dogs being let off leash and not being under control in Thorncliff Park. The biggest complaint has been about owners not picking up after their dogs.

According to City of Edmonton Bylaws, dogs are NOT allowed on parkland property (i.e. Callingwood Park, Thorncliff Park and the Whitemud Green Spaces) even if they are leashed and under control. The Thorncliff skating rink is not to be used as a dog park during the summer time. Dogs are only allowed on City Parkland where signage permits or the area has been designated as a legal off leash area. Thorncliff Park is neither of these but dogs can be walked on the trail system as long as they are leashed and kept at least ten metres from any developed playground or picnic site.

Bylaw officers have been more active since the many complaints of uncontrolled dogs in the park and playgrounds, as well as abandoned dog poop. Please be mindful that everyone uses these spaces and those without dogs are not accustomed to watching for "dog droppings" in fields and playgrounds.
