Hapkido is a highly eclectic Korean Martial Art. It is a form of self-defence that employs joint locks, grappling, and throwing techniques similar to those of other martial arts, as well as kicks, punches, and other striking attacks. Hapkido employs both long-range and closerange fighting techniques, utilizing jumping kicks and percussive hand strikes at longer ranges, pressure point strikes, joint locks, and throws at closer fighting distances. Hapkido emphasizes circular motion, redirection of force, and control of the opponent. Practitioners seek to gain advantage over their opponents through footwork and body positioning to incorporate the use of leverage, avoiding the use of brute strength against brute strength.

Local Resident Writes to MLA Nielsen on Proposed Veteran Housing

Dear Mr. Nielsen,

The Homes for Heroes foundation from Calgary has issued a proposal for a 20 to 25- unit Tiny Village for homeless veterans in the city of Edmonton.

At the moment, their choice of location is a small parcel of land on the north side. Specifically, the piece of land is south and east of the intersection of 153 Avenue and 94A Street.

The only Open House we've had was held at the Evansdale Community Hall in May 2019. It was set up by Homes for Heroes Foundation with attendees from the City of Edmonton and our Community. This open house was the first opportunity for the residents of Evansdale to learn about the Tiny Village.

At the Open House, we listened to the reasons that Homes for Heroes chose this particular location. A few of the reasons are:

- Close to City transit
- An attractive lease agreement with the City of Edmonton (\$1/year for 20 years)
- They could fit 20 to 25 tiny homes in the space

We, as a community, agree with their plan to create housing for our less-fortunate veterans. We believe that a warm and loving environment will go a long way to help them integrate into a community.

Our greatest concern is the location chosen, that being on 153 Avenue between 94A and 94 Streets. 153 Avenue is an extremely busy road the traffic is constant day and night. It's a popular route for emergency vehicles, and we've heard up to as many as 5 emergency vehicles on a daily basis.

Living that close to a constant stream of traffic will not be relaxing for anyone. When I imagine our veterans living directly along 153 Avenue, I can only think that we need to do better. Could we look at better locations more suited to the needs of our veterans? The reality of the situation is that if this much-needed housing project gets built on this piece of land, we can literally say that we have kicked our veterans to the curb.

If we really believe this is the best we can do for veterans struggling with issues, we should feel ashamed.

Please - Come out to the site and see for yourself. Spend some time sitting on the Transit Bench (the housing project would be built right behind you as you're facing 153 Avenue). You may soon understand that this is not a tranquil place for our displaced veterans.

We all have veterans in our families, and I would not want them to think that this is the best that we could do.

A further meeting will be held at the Evansdale Community Hall at the initiative of either the Community League or the City to discuss the re-zoning application being submitted by Homes for Heroes. All residents of Evansdale, Belle Rive and Eaux Claire will be notified of this meeting by mail, as the City will notify only those residents living within 60 meters of the proposed development.

Background: Homes For Heroes Foundation is a non-profit organization supporting veterans. Our mandate is to provide the framework needed to ensure all military veterans are given the opportunity to successfully reintegrate into civilian life.

Homes For Heroes is currently working on a development proposal in the community of Evansdale located at 9404-152A Avenue NW and 9323-153 Avenue NW. The site is in the southeasterly corner of the intersection at 153rd Avenue NW and 94A Street NW. The proposed plan is to build a tiny home village with full support service for our Canadian military veterans who are experiencing a challenging time transition back to civilian life. The Evansdale Homes For Heroes village will have approximately 20-25 tiny homes, a resources center, councillor's office, community gardens, park space, and a memorial tribute to soldiers lost in Afghanistan.

Expansion of Community Garden in McLeod

This spring and summer a new community garden grew out of the joining of Sunshine Vines Community Garden and Friendship Community Garden: Sunshine & Friendship Community Garden! We are located at St. Michael and All Angels Anglican Church in Casselman.

Friendship Community Garden is a part of the Edmonton Multicultural Coalition's Kilkenny Neighbourhood Programming, focussed on communitybuilding with respect to food security in diverse ethnocultural and mainstream communities in Kilkenny and surrounding neighbourhoods. Sunshine Vines is a community garden based out of St. Michael and All Angels Anglican Church. Joining together increased the number of plots at the church increased from four to 18!

Thanks to the financial support of McLeod Community League as well donations from Cleanit Greenit, Jils Landscape Supply, and Salisbury Greenhouse, in addition to some excellent physical help from Culinary Arts Instructor Andrew Hess and his students at ME LaZerte, transportation donated by Dave Larsen and Tracey Smith, and help provided by Church members and neighbours, we were able to build 16 new beds, fill them with soil and compost, get a water system hooked up to the eaves of the church's garage, and grow an abundant garden all this year!

While all of our beds are currently filled, next year at the garden we are looking forward to creating more ways to spend time in the garden as non-gardeners, and will always be looking for community members who are interested in helping us with the two shared community plots.

Traffic Safety- Distracted Driving

Here is what you cannot do while driving which includes being stopped at red light

- Hold, View or manipulate cell phones
- Use electronic devices such a laptop, video games, cameras, video entertainment displays, program audio players, enter info on GPS systems
- Read printed material, print or sketch
- Engage in grooming or personal hygiene
- Did you know all these activities are not permitted when stopped at red light or in a drive thru? Fine amount is \$287.00 and three demerit points.

Here is what you can do

- Drink a beverage-Coffee, Tea, Juice, Water or Pop
 - Eat a snack
- Engage in conversation with passengers
- Smoke a cigarette if there are no minors in the vehicle
 - Use hands-free devices
- Use Two Way radios when a driver is required to remain in contact with employer.
- Use GPS if mounted and information is entered before driving
- Vehicle information system that provides information of location of vehicle and vehicle operating systems. Can be a gauge instrument or device.

• Use collision avoidance is clear and visible system

- Use alcohol ignition interlock device
- Use a dispatch system for transporting passengers or logistical transportation system that track location, driver status and/or delivery of commercial goods.
- Use portable audio system if set up to use before driving
- Hold your phone to call 911 for emergency call

Under the Traffic Safety Act, an emergency vehicle includes Police, Peace Officer, Sheriff, Fire Response Units, Ambulance and Gas Disconnection Units. Drivers of emergency vehicles are permitted to use hand-held communication devices or any other electronic devices when acting within the scope of their employment.

Winter Driving

Ensure snow, ice and frost is removed from your windshield and windows

Failure to do so can result in a Violation Ticket of \$155.00

- Ensure your headlights are clean
- Ensure snow is removed from your hood and roof

Failure to so can result in a Violation Ticket of \$465.00

- Ensure your windshield washer reservoir is full of winter solution
 - Ensure you license plate

Failure to do so can result in a Violation Ticket of \$155.00. Licence plate covers are not permitted and assist with the license plate being obscured. Reflective license plate covers that distort the view from the sides can cost you a Violation Ticket of \$465.00

In addition, Chevrolet and GMC Pickup owners, if your spare tire access cover is open blocking your license plate you can be issued Violation Ticket of \$155.00

Parking

Did you know that a vehicle can only be left unmoved for 72 hours on a highway which includes roadway. Now that the snow has fallen it is easy to spot the vehicles not moving on a regular basis due to snow on the vehicle and the dry pavement underneath.

If the vehicle is not moved every 72 hours it is then considered Abandoned and can come with a fine of \$310.00 plus the cost of Tow. If you are not driving the vehicle every 72 hours I suggest putting the vehicle on a driveway or garage. If you spot an abandoned vehicle you can report it by calling 311.

Parking Bans can be declared between November 5 and March 15 with 8 hours notice to conduct snow plowing or removal.

Bans remain in effect until the City declares it is over. Please don't park on a plowed bus route until the ban has been officially lifted. Failure to comply with the Parking Ban may result in a Fine of \$100 plus the cost of

Sidewalks

Please maintain your sidewalk adjacent to your property. It is your responsibility and failure to so can result in a Fine of \$100.00 plus the cost of the City hiring a Contractor to remedy the situation which then gets put on the homeowners' tax roll. I encourage you as neighbors to help out your fellow neighbors who may struggle or cannot shovel or remove ice from their sidewalks due to injury or disability. Unfortunately, the City of Edmonton does not have a Snow Angels Program. If you choose to report snow covered or icy sidewalks that are the responsibility of a homeowner, business owner or the City you can call 311.

It is also an offence to put an Electrical Cord over a sidewalk as it is a tripping hazard. Your cord could be removed, and you may be fined up to \$100.00.

Please do not park on or across a sidewalk. You could be fined up to \$100.00.

I encourage you as neighbors if you have an issue and you feel comfortable talking to your neighbor to speak to them directly about it. If you don't feel comfortable you can call 311 or download the 311 APP and make a complaint.

Keeping McLeod Shrubs Healthy

Black Knot is caused by the fungus Apiosporina morbosa. It infects trees within the Prunus genus, which includes different types of plum and cherry trees. It has also been known to infect shrubs in the Rose family. It is spread through spores by rain, wind, birds, and insects that have had contact with infected trees. The spores spread in the spring and infect other trees, then in the summer the infection creates green swellings at the tip of the branches. In the following years these swellings blacken and enlarge.

At the Edmonton and Area Land Trust (www.ealt.ca), we work hard to steward our lands. Part of this stewardship includes the monitoring and removal of harmful species, which ensures the continued health and success of our lands. You can volunteer with us to help keep our lands safe, or look for this infection on the shrubs in your yard, and remove them to keep your vegetation healthy.

You'll need: clippers, garbage bags, diluted bleach spray, rags and gloves. Start but cutting each infected branch at least 6-8 inches below the knot. Try to prune to the start of the branch instead of leaving a stump. Clean your blades with bleach in between each cut. Diseased branches can still release spores for up to 4 months after they have been removed, so it is important to bag and dispose of them properly. In-



spect your property each year to make sure you can stop the spread of Black Knot within your own neighbourhood.
